The Lynchburg-Clay Athletic Hall of Fame was created in 2011 to honor great Mustang athletes of the past. Since its' inception, the Hall of Fame has been dominated by basketball players. The 2018 induction class will add some diversity to the Hall of Fame as the two inductees are most known for their accomplishments on the baseball field.

Joe Wells (1994-1998) was a multi-sport athlete during his time at Lynchburg-Clay, but it is in baseball that he made the greatest impact. Joe was a four year player on the Varsity baseball team. He played on 3 Southern Hills Athletic Conference Championship teams (1995, 1996, and 1998), 2 Sectional Championship teams (1996 and 1997), 1 District Runner-Up (1996), and 1 District Championship team (1997). During his 4 years, the Mustangs had a league record of 46-6 and an overall record of 70-22.

As an individual player, Joe was naturally gifted with a strong arm, quick feet, and smooth swing and it showed on the field. His combined statistics for his junior and senior seasons were a batting average of .476, 61 RBI's, 12 HR's, 18 doubles, 55 runs scored, and 27 stolen bases. He was named to the All Southern Hills League team twice (1997 and 1998), 1st team All-Southeast District team (1998), and 1st team Division III All Ohio (1998). The four years that Joe played baseball is with a doubt the most successful period in the history of the Lynchburg-Clay baseball program.

Aric Fiscus served as Varsity baseball coach from 1997-2010. During those 14 years, the Lynchburg-Clay baseball program won 7 Southern Hills Athletic Conference Championships, 3 Sectional Championships, and 1 District Championship. He was named the Southern Hills Athletic Conference Coach of the Year 3 times and finished with a career coaching record of 182-103, making him the winningest coach in Lynchburg-Clay baseball program history.

Aric also served as Athletic Director from 1999-2006. As Athletic Director, Aric played an instrumental role in the creation of the existing outdoor athletic complex at the high school. During his tenure as AD, he oversaw an athletic department that won 14 SHAC championships, 22 sectional championships, and 2 District Championships.

Over the years, the Lynchburg-Clay baseball program has been very strong, winning 25 SHAC championships. It is fitting that Joe and Coach Fiscus will represent that program in the Hall of Fame. Congratulations Joe and Aric on your induction.


### Joe Wells (1994-1998) Baseball, Basketball, Soccer, Golf

Joe Wells was a multi-sport athlete during his time at Lynchburg-Clay. He played golf, soccer and basketball (where he was named to the All-Southeast District Team twice), but it is in baseball that he made the greatest impact. Joe was a four year player on the Varsity baseball team. He played the outfield during his Freshman and Sophomore years and really came into his own when he took over the shortstop position as a Junior and Senior. He played on 3 Southern Hills Athletic Conference Championship teams (1995, 1996, and 1998), 2 Sectional Championship teams (1996 and 1997), 1 District Runner-Up (1996), and 1 District Championship team (1997). During his 4 years, the Mustangs had a league record of 46-6 and an overall record of 70-22. The 1997 team that he played on is arguably the best baseball team that Lynchburg-Clay has ever produced.


As an individual player, Joe was naturally gifted with a strong arm, quick feet, and smooth swing and it showed on the field. During his Junior year, he batted third in the lineup and finished the season with a .430 batting average, 34 RBI's, 5 HR's, 29 runs scored, and 14 stolen bases. During his senior season, his batting average was .556, he had 7 HR's, 27 RBI's, 26 runs scored, and 13 stolen bases. He was named to the All Southern Hills League team, 1<sup>st</sup> team All-Southeast District team, and was also named 1<sup>st</sup> team Division III All Ohio. The four years that Joe played baseball is with a doubt the most successful period in the history of the Lynchburg-Clay baseball program.

Joe and his wife, Kelly, have been married for 14 years. They live in the Lynchburg area with their 3 children Ava (11), Ayden (9), and Jace (5).




Joe batting during the 1998 season.



During Joe's freshman year, he was a member of a team that started five seniors, two juniors and one freshman. The team finished as Southern Hills League champions with an undefeated league record, sectional champions and runner up in the district finals to the eventual state champions Wheelersburg. The team finished the 1996 season with a record of 22-3. As a freshman, Joe had a knowledge base of both offensively and defensively of sound fundamentals and used his strong arm while playing the outfield to throw out unsuspecting runners trying to gain an extra base.

Joe Wells' induction into the Lynchburg-Clay Athletic Hall of Fame is well-deserved. Without a doubt Joe is one of the greatest natural athletes in the history of Lynchburg-Clay. My first experience in coaching Joe was in soccer. I didn't have much knowledge of what had happened in the program before I took over so I went ahead with coaching the team without preconceived notions on where anyone would play. It didn't take long to realize that Joe would be a great asset on the offensive end of the field with his speed and quickness. What I was surprised to learn early on is that he hadn't played soccer all that long. Just like anything he did though, he was a natural. I will have conversations about Joe with people from time to time. My description of him always is something along the lines of "he is the type of athlete that produced at a very high level, no matter the sport or his level of experience in the sport." My go-to phrase about him always is "He is the type of athlete that would be the best polo player you ever saw. It doesn't matter if it is water polo and he has to jump into a pool or regular polo and he has to jump on the back of a horse, he would be among the best."

Even though I didn't coach him in basketball, a game sticks in my mind that I watched him play in Ripley. For a period of about three minutes I saw him take over a game like I had never seen a high school player do before on both ends of the floor. He had several steals and several points. Ripley had to start fouling him because they had no prayer of stopping him. He then went to the line and made several free throws.

For all of the great things he did in soccer and basketball I truly believe that, in his heart, he was a baseball player first and foremost. He never told me that but it was evident watching him. When you see a player on the field that glides, and looks as though his feet aren't touching the ground, you know you are looking at an extraordinary player. At the plate his hands were almost too fast for the Southern Hills League. A game at West Union comes to mind where Joe was at the plate and he hit, what felt like, 27 foul balls. All of them would have been well over the fence if fair. In that one at-bat he almost caused West Union to have to change pitchers. I was so impressed with the foul balls I can't even remember the outcome of the at-bat. I have no doubt that he could have started on any high school baseball team in Ohio. It was almost unfair at times that he didn't get to test his abilities against players that received more accolades because I believe he could have hung right there with them, and outshone some of them.

I truly believe that the best thing that a coach, or leader, can do at times is to stay out of the way. My first year as head baseball coach was 1997. Joe was a junior that year and our team was made up of juniors and seniors. There was a healthy competitive atmosphere between the two classes which, I believe, contributed to the success of that team. People lead in different ways. Some are vocal and some are not. Joe led in a more non-vocal way, going about his business and providing contributions at key times through plays in the field or the clutch hit at the plate. Coaches will sometimes look to their better players and tell them they have to be more vocal for the good of the team. Even in my youth and ignorance my main contribution to Joe's leadership style was to leave him alone and let him lead as he chose. In looking back I'm glad I didn't make a young coach mistake in trying to saddle him with something that might have caused him to not achieve at the level at which he was capable.

It was a true honor to be able to coach Joe. It is a bigger honor to be able to be inducted tonight with him. He has done things on athletic fields that I will ever do. More importantly he has turned out to be a successful man, with a great family, and is a great father. As a coach that is the most important thing to me and I hope that I had some role in that success. I'm very proud of him and I know his Grandpa Bill is looking down on him with pride as well.

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
### Aric Fiscus Baseball Coach, 1997-2010 Athletic Director, 1999-2006

Aric Fiscus was employed by the Lynchburg-Clay School District from 1995-2010. During that time period, he taught students about the intricacies of civics and government in his social studies classroom. His teaching continued on the athletic field where he taught his players the importance of hard work, individual responsibility, and the value of setting goals. Aric served as Athletic Director and coached JV baseball and soccer, but he made his greatest impression as the Varsity baseball coach.

Aric Fiscus was named Varsity baseball coach for the 1997 season and coached through the 2010 season. During Aric's 14 years as coach, the Lynchburg-Clay baseball program won 7 Southern Hills Athletic Conference Championships (1998, 1999, 2000, 2003, 2005, 2006, 2010), 3 Sectional Championships (1997, 2000, 2001), and 1 District Championship (1997). He was named the Southern Hills Athletic Conference Coach of the Year 3 times (1999, 2005, 2010) and finished with a career coaching record of 182-103, making him the winningest coach in Lynchburg-Clay baseball program history. 34 baseball players were named to the All Southern Hills Athletic Conference team while Aric served as coach. 2 of his players would go on to play at the Division I college level.

Aric was more than just a baseball coach. He served as Athletic Director from 1999-2006 and played an instrumental role in the creation of the existing outdoor athletic complex at the high school. During his tenure as AD, the baseball field, softball field, soccer field and concession stand/storage building were constructed. He was also the boys soccer coach from 1995-1999. Although there was not an official SHAC soccer league at the time, the boys program evolved into a contending team during that time period.

In 2011, Aric was named the Principal of Ripley Elementary, where he stills serves today. His first wife, Jennifer, passed away in 2007. He and his current wife Becky and son PJ reside in the Lynchburg-Clay School District.

Coach Fiscus was a central figure in my life for the duration of my four years in high school as I attended his classes and participated in sports. He was calm when faced with disruptive students, player egos, and whatever else he encountered along the way. In my time as a player, he was always supportive and encouraging, even if I was struggling on the mound, in the field, or at the plate. I can't remember a time he yelled at me or was negative toward me in the heat of the moment. I also had the pleasure of being one of his assistant coaches on the varsity baseball team after I graduated from college. I took away some experiences from that time that I still use to this day as I help coach a 12U travel softball team year-round. His example of calm leadership and enabling players to be confident in themselves is something I've tried to pass on to the young ladies I see week in and week out. I started coaching with Coach Fiscus as the JV coach and later as a varsity assistant. During those years, the Lynchburg Clay baseball program continue to dominate the Southern Hills Athletic Conference. Aric was a young coach with a tremendous knowledge and respect for the game. His players respected him because he treated them as adults. Yet he had the patience needed to coach young men.

Aric was very good in preparing for an opponent. One of his best efforts came in a tournament game versus Frankfort Adena. Adena was a perennial contender for the state championship. Our team was good but not on Adena's level. Coach Fiscus decided to use multiple pitchers in the game so that the Adena batters would not have the opportunity to see the same pitchers twice. They would constantly be adjusting to a different style or speed. It worked well enough that we were winning with only one out to go in the seventh inning. Unfortunately we committed an infield error which led to Adena winning the game, They went on to win the state championship. Even though we lost, Adena was impressed with way Coach Fiscus had prepared our team to compete with Adena.

Whenever I think of those years working with Aric, two memories are triggered. The first was his rivalry with Coach Veidt at Whiteoak. They were two of the best coaches in the league and year after year would be at the top of the league standings. They both hated to lose but they really despised losing to one another. You could always expect a close, highly contested game with each coach pulling out every trick to give his team the advantage.

The other memory was the road trips and the conversations that passed the time going to and from the games. Those conversations would invariably involve music and what groups were the most important to each of us as coaches. Wayne King, Ben Higgins, Garyn Waits and I would each have differing views but Aric always had only one. He was and is to this day, a die hard fan of the group "Styx". He has seen them countless times and is a fountain of knowledge on all things related to the group. It was fun to challenge his devotion to then.

Coach Fiscus was passionate about the game and his responsibilities as a coach. The program's success was something he took very seriously. His record during those years was one of the best in the state. Congratulations to him on his well-deserved induction into the Lynchburg Clay Hall of Fame.





### Lauren (King) Davis (2002-2006) Soccer, basketball, Softball

Lauren King Davis was a multi-sport athlete at Lynchburg-Clay, but she is best known for playing soccer. The soccer teams that she played on at Lynchburg-Clay were trendsetters, doing what no other LC soccer team had done before. She led a group of seniors that were the first to win champion-ships in the Southern Hills League, the Sectional, and the District for girls soccer. As a group, they would win 3 SHL Championships, 4 sectional championships, 1 District Championship, and were Regional Runners-Up. This group drew the blueprint for success that is currently being used by the soccer program today.

As an individual, Lauren was also a trendsetter. She was named to the All-SHL team 4 times, 1<sup>st</sup> team All-Southeast District 4 times, 1<sup>st</sup> team All-Ohio and was named to the National Scholastic Soccer Coaches Association All-Region IV Team. Her 69 career goals was the school record when she graduated. Lauren was the most skilled player in a very successful group of players. Her skill would ultimately become the catalyst for her teammates to build off of.

Lauren also played 4 years of basketball and 1 year of softball. The basketball teams that she played on were very successful as well, winning 2 SHL and 2 Sectional Championships.

After graduating from Lynchburg-Clay, Lauren attended Wilmington College and in 2008 started working in the mortgage industry. Lauren and her husband, Kevin now live in Indianapolis, Indiana where they own and operate a title insurance company.











Brian Glover played multiple sports at Lynchburg-Clay, but it is undeniable that he will be remembered for his basketball accomplishments. When he played, Brian brought an unbridled enthusiasm for the game. He played with passion and always gave everything he had, both during games and at practice. Brian played on teams that won the Southern Hills League Championship, 2 Sectional Championships, a District Championship, and a Regional Championship. He was a key member of the only Lynchburg-Clay team to ever appear in the State Final Four.

On and individual level, Brian was named to the All Southern Hills League team 3 times, was the MVP of the All Highland County team, 2<sup>nd</sup> Team All Southeast District, 1<sup>st</sup> Team All Southeast District and Player of the Year, Honorable Mention All Ohio, 1<sup>st</sup> Team All Ohio, and was named to the All Final Four Team. Brian finished with 1239 points career points, which was third all time when he graduated. He also scored 46 points in a game, which places him second in Lynchburg-Clay boys basketball history.

Brian was a basketball player that gave 100% every day and got as much out of his potential as he could. That desire to succeed was infectious both to his teammates and to the Lynchburg-Clay fans in the stands. Nobody could complain about not getting their money's worth when they watched Brian play.

Brian currently lives in Columbus where he is a store director for Meijer. He and his wife, Sonya, have been married for 13 years and they have 4 children; Dakota, Mackenzie, Aden, and Kylee.

During those 4 years at Lynchburg-Clay, Kim participated in 4 sports; basketball (4 years), soccer (4 years) softball (4 years), and track (2 years). While she was a key member of those teams, Kim will most be remembered for playing basketball at Lynchburg-Clay. Individually, Kim scored 1313 points, which is currently 3<sup>rd</sup> all-time at Lynchburg-Clay. She made 150 career three pointers, including 82 during her Junior season. She also scored 41 points vs. Blanchester in 1992. All of these accomplishments are school records. She was named to the All Highland County team twice, the All-SHL team twice, was 1<sup>st</sup> team AP All District twice, 1st team All Southeast District twice, and was All-Ohio twice. She played on teams that won 1 SHL championship, 3 Sectional Championships, 1 District Championship, and were Regional Runners-Up. Kim also played in the Ohio/Kentucky All-Start game. After graduating from Lynchburg-Clay, Kim attended Wright State University and graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Organizational Leadership degree. She currently lives in Centerville, Ohio.





### **Glenn Moberly**

Glenn Moberly began his teaching and coaching career at Lynchburg-Clay in 1972. When his teaching career ended in 1998, Glenn had played a significant role in the lives of many Lynchburg-Clay student-athletes. During the years 1972-1994 Glenn coached 11 different teams over 27 seasons. He coached Varsity Baseball, Boys Soccer, Girls Soccer, Varsity Girls Basketball, JV Girls Basketball, Freshmen Boys Basketball, JV Boys Basketball, Varsity Boys Basketball, Golf, and Cross-Country. Coach Moberly's teams won Southern Hills Athletic Conference championships and were runners-up in the SHAC and County Tournaments. He is responsible for starting the soccer programs at Lynchburg-Clay, were he had a 48-12-1 record as boys coach.

Glenn became the Lynchburg-Clay Athletic Director in 1987 and would serve in that position through the 1996-97 school year. During his tenure as Athletic Director, Lynchburg-Clay won 12 SHAC championships (4 undefeated), 13 Sectional Championships, 4 District Championships, 1 Regional Runner-Up, and 1 Regional Championship. Glenn was named the Southeast District Athletic Administrator of the Year in 1992. He was selected to the Ohio Inner-Scholastic Athletic Administrator Southeast District Hall of Fame in 1995. Without a doubt, Glenn Moberly played an important role in the Lynchburg-Clay Mustang Athletic Department

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

### Terry McGinnis Community Member and Athletic Supporter

In 1978, Terry McGinnis and his wife Janie bought what would become Terry's Grocery. Since then, Terry has been instrumental in supporting the youth within the Lynchburg-Clay School District. He has sponsored countless youth teams in pee wee basketball, little league baseball and SAY soccer. In 1999, Terry's generosity led to the formation of Hoagie Day. On the third Thursday of every month, Terry donates the money for every hoagie sold to the Lynchburg-Clay Athletic Boosters. The money raised has been used to furnish the weight room in the field house, purchase warmups for basketball teams, and equipment for high school teams. It has also been used as scholarships for Lynchburg-Clay graduates. Since 1999, Terry McGinnis has given approximately \$93,000 to Lynchburg-Clay through Hoagie Day. Overall, he has given over \$150,000 to the Lynchburg-Clay Athletic Program. Over the last 33 years, every Lynchburg-Clay Athlete has benefited from Terry's generosity in some way or another.

Terry lives in the Lynchburg-Clay school district with his wife Janie. Together, they have 5 children and 8 grandchildren; Bridgette Pritchard, her husband Ron and their daughter Savannah, TJ McGinnis and his son Mason, Jessica McGinnis and her daughters Tiah and Zoey McClean, Nicole Van Fleet and her husband Ryan and their children Trinity, Olivia, and Alex; and Deirdre Butler her husband Bruce, and their daughter Brogan.

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### Andy Richmond 1966-70 Basketball

The Lynchburg-Clay School District was formed in 1966 and Andy Richmond was instrumental in putting the Mustangs on the map athletically. While Andy participated in Cross-Country, Track, Baseball, and Volleyball, it was in basketball that he was most dominant. In 1967, Andy started 3 tournament games as Freshman and was instrumental in Lynchburg-Clay winning their first ever Sectional Championship. He would go on to start for the varsity Mustangs for the next 3 years. During those years he accumulated 1361 points, which was the school record until 1993 (and is still second most all -time). He also grabbed 940 rebounds during his career, which is still the Lynchburg-Clay career record. He set the single game scoring record with 43 points vs. Eastern on February 13, 1970 (it has since be broken) and he set the school single game record with 28 rebounds vs. Fayetteville on November 22, 1969 (which still stands). His career averages were 20.6 points per game and 14.2 rebounds per game. In 1969, he led the Mustangs to the Highland County League Championship, was named to the Seaman Christmas Invitational All-Tournament Team, and was named All-Ohio.

During his basketball career, Andy received scholarship offers from numerous colleges, including a call from Joe B. Hall and the University of Kentucky, but chose to enroll at Gulf Coast Community College in Panama City, Florida upon graduation from Lynchburg-Clay. He returned from Florida and lived in the Highland County area until his death on July 5, 1990. He is survived by his 4 children and 8 grandchildren: Toni Richmond and her children Ryan and Cheyenne; Traci Fittro and her husband John and their children Alec, Morgan, and Zoe; Chad Richmond and wife Nicole and their children Noah and Morgan; and Heath and his daughter Grace.


As a player, Linda graduated as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1625 points (since eclipsed by Whitney Lewis), the school's all-time leader in rebounds with 1192 (currently 10<sup>th</sup> in state of Ohio). She holds the school's single game scoring record (41) and rebound record (36). She was the first player in Southern Hills League history to be named all-league 4 times in one sport.

Linda's athletic achievements led her to Wilmington College, where she participated in basketball from 1981-1985. While there, she was named to the WBCC 1<sup>st</sup> team and the NAIA District 22 All-Star team all 4 years. Linda was named to the NAIA All-American team in 1985 and to the Academic All-American team in 1984 and 1985. She was inducted to the Wilmington College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

As a coach at Lynchburg-Clay, Linda's record speaks for itself. She is the most successful coach in Lynchburg-Clay History. Currently, Linda serves as the Principal of Lynchburg-Clay High School. She lives in Lynchburg with her husband, Rob, and daughters Codi and Cali.

### Jesse Mount Scorekeeper and Bus Driver

Jesse Mount has longed been associated with Lynchburg-Clay athletics. After graduating from Lynchburg High School in 1948, Jesse began keeping the scorebook for the boys basketball team. He has maintained that position every year since then, for a total of 62 years. He has driven the team bus for the last 46 years. He began driving the girls team bus 18 years ago and has kept their scorebook during that time period. Over the years, Jesse was able to be a scorekeeper in the 1993 Boys State Tournament when the Lynchburg-Clay boys team participated the state tournament. In 1996 and 1997 the Ohio High School Athletic Association named him the official scorekeeper at the boys state tournament. He also was the scorekeeper for Lynchburg-Clay's 2 Elite-Eight girls teams (1992 and 2003). During the off-seasons, Jesse was an assistant softball coach at Lynchburg-Clay for 10 years and has driven the volleyball bus for the past 18 years. Without a doubt, no person has participated in more Lynchburg-Clay athletics events than Jesse Mount.



During Whitney's career, the Lady Mustangs won an SHL championship (undefeated in 2003), 4 sectional championships, a District championship (2003), and were regional runner-ups (2003). Whitney participated in the Ohio North/South All-Star game and the Ohio/Kentucky All-Star game. In terms of career records at Lynchburg-Clay, she is first in scoring (1705 points), second in rebounds (1033), and first in blocks (560). Her career blocks total ranked her first in the state of Ohio when she graduated (it has since be eclipsed and she now stands second).

While at Lynchburg-Clay, Whitney was a member of the National Honor Society, was valedictorian, and was a finalist for the Academic Hall of Fame.
